GOLDEN RETRIEVER LIFETIME STUDY

In 2023, the Morris
Animal Foundation celebrated the 11th anniversary
of the Golden Retriever
Lifetime Study (GRLS).
And they had much to
celebrate. During the 11
years since its launch, the
study surpassed its goal of
enrolling 3,000 dogs, with
3,044 dogs enrolled. Hard to
believe, but the owners also
agreed to comply with the
study requirements over a
lengthy period of time.

Of the enrolled participating dogs, 192 owners did not comply with the study requirements one vear after their enrollment. (I reserve judgement as to why a responsible Golden owner would not be "all in" to advance the goals of such an important study.) Owners of dogs without a vaccination record (what?) were nearly four times more noncompliant than those with vaccinated dogs. And stranger yet, owners of dogs who slept in the garage (for
